



Variety's **My Bike**® Program, **My Stroller**® Program, & **My Voice**® Program:

All equipment is provided at **NO COST** to families that meet the program's eligibility requirements.

Variety's **My Bike Program** currently provides a Rifton adaptive bike (including stationary stands and prescribed accessories) to eligible children with disabilities, so they can experience the joy, freedom, and belonging that comes from riding a bike alongside friends and family.

"Having an adaptive bike allows us to go places as a family that we could never go to now. Aaron doesn't have enough leg strength to keep his legs on a typical bike pedal, so we can only go short distances with a typical bike."

Variety's **My Stroller Program** currently provides a Convoid EZ Rider adaptive stroller to eligible kids for "on-the-go" mobility or general safety / inclusion in the community. With an adaptive stroller, kids are no longer isolated, and it has an immediate impact on their lives. For others, a child might need an adaptive stroller to stay safe and secure while out in the community.

*"Jayla's condition causes her to fall a lot, and her body weakens after just a little bit of activity, even a walk. We haven't been able to go places that require walking because she needs to be carried and that is no easy feat. **This stroller opens up so many things for her** – trips to the mall, walks through Target, family walks in the park, and even walks around our neighborhood, which we had to stop when her disability got worse."*

Variety's **My Voice Program** provides a communication device (i.e. a restricted iPad with a prescribed communication app) to eligible children with a communication disorder to give them a voice and enable them to express their thoughts, feelings, wants, and needs 24/7.

*"Carleigh is already doing so well with her communication device, and she only had it one day. She is navigating through it, and she was so excited to show mom at the end of the day! Mom asked her what she wanted to eat, and she told her, 'hamburger' with her device! **This communication device is going to change Carleigh's life and give her a voice now.***

What is Variety the Children's Charity?

- ❖ With a mission to empower children with disabilities to live life to the fullest, Variety the Children's Charity provides life-changing mobility and communication equipment to ensure our most vulnerable kids are no longer left out, left behind, or excluded. **Simply, we're helping kids, be kids by meeting tangible, unmet needs.**
- ❖ Initially founded as a social club in 1927, the so-named "Variety Club" quickly evolved into a charity one-year later after the group found a baby girl who was left in the Sheridan Theatre in Pittsburgh.
- ❖ After listening to parents, Variety's **My Bike®** Program kicked off on November 5, 2012, and the success of **My Bike** led to the creation of Variety's **My Stroller®** and **My Voice®** Programs, which both kicked off on November 14, 2014.
- ❖ In total, more than **6,700** adaptive bikes, adaptive strollers, and communication devices have been presented since November 2012 (**surpassing \$10.1 million** in equipment).

Who is eligible for Variety's equipment programs?

- Variety's adaptive equipment programs serve children and youth who have a documented mental, physical, or sensory disability; reside in Variety's service area; are 3 through 21 years of age; meet the income guidelines; as well as the other eligibility requirements outlined in the application.
- An applicant's household income must meet the current income guidelines, including: **2** household members (below \$98,600); **3** household members (below \$124,300); **4** household members (below \$150,000); **5** household members (below \$175,700); **6** household members (below \$201,400); **7** household members (below \$227,100); **8** household members (below \$252,800); **9** household members (below \$278,500).

Variety recognizes that families who have a child with disabilities typically experience greater expenses due to medical costs, therapy appointments, equipment, medications, and a variety of other needs or circumstances.

All equipment is provided at NO COST to families that meet the program's guidelines.

- Service Area includes **59 counties in Pennsylvania**: Adams, Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Bedford, Blair, Bradford, Butler, Cambria, Cameron, Carbon, Centre, Clarion, Clearfield, Clinton, Columbia, Crawford, Cumberland, Dauphin, Elk, Erie, Fayette, Forest, Franklin, Fulton, Greene, Huntingdon, Indiana, Jefferson, Juniata, Lackawanna, Lawrence, Lehigh, Luzerne, Lycoming, McKean, Mercer, Mifflin, Monroe, Montour, Northampton, Northumberland, Perry, Pike, Potter, Schuylkill, Somerset, Snyder, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Tioga, Union, Venango, Warren, Washington, Wayne, Westmoreland, Wyoming, and York Counties; and **Ohio County, West Virginia**.

How does someone apply to Variety's equipment programs?

- **New applications for an adaptive bike will once again be accepted starting on November 1, 2023.**
- Eligible families can apply all year long for one, two, or even all three pieces of equipment if the child can benefit – **you do not need to choose just one.**

How much does it cost to sponsor equipment & how can someone donate?

- The cost to sponsor one adaptive bike is \$2,500, one adaptive stroller is \$1,800, and one communication device is \$1,200.
